


How well known is your issue?

Period poverty: 14.2% of college menstruating people in the U.S. had experienced period poverty in the last year.


10% of menstruating college students experience this monthly.

THE VILLAGE AT TWENTY






Laying the groundwork steps

- 4. Do other people know this is a problem?
- 5. What do you want to do? Narrow in focus!
- 6. Is your idea evidence-based? Based on stats? Lived experience?
- 7. Does this program exist already?
- 8. Who is with you?
- 9. How are you going to pay for it?
- 10. What is your timeline?
- 11. What are your goals and what do you want to measure?
- 12. Are there any risks?
- 13. Could this program cause harm?
- 14. Make participation easy!
