Acknowledging structural racism, ableism and other forms of oppression





Vaccine Basics

COVID-19 and Vaccine Basics

What is a vaccine and how does it work?

- Vaccines work with your body to safely build protection from a disease.
- They give us protection, without having to get the disease first.
- Vaccines are important because they prevent disease, instead of curing or healing disease after a person is sick.
- COVID-19 vaccination will help protect you by building immunity without the risk of severe illness.

Common side effects

On the arm where you got the shot:



- Pain
- Redness
- Swelling

Throughout the rest of your body:



- Tiredness
- Headache
- Muscle pain
- Chills
- Fever
- Nausea

To reduce pain and discomfort where you got the shot



- Apply a clean, cool, wet washcloth over the area.
- Use or exercise your arm.

To reduce discomfort from fever




- Drink plenty of fluids.
- Dress lightly.

After Vaccination

Continue COVID-19 prevention measures:



nose and mouth with a mask.



Stay at least 6
feet from
people who
don't live with
you.



Avoid crowds and poorly ventilated spaces.



Wash your hands.



Clean and disinfect frequently touched surfaces.

- Enroll in v-safe program to track any symptoms.
- If you have questions about your health and vaccination, call your doctor, nurse, or clinic.

COVID-19 Vaccine in Pregnancy



FAQ: I would like to have a baby one day. Is it safe or me to get a COVID-19 vaccine?

- Yes. People who are trying to become pregnant now or who plan to try in the future may receive the COVID-19 vaccine when it becomes available to them.
- Based on what we know right now, experts believe that COVID-19 vaccines are safe for someone who is trying to become pregnant in the short or long term.
- There is no evidence that fertility problems are a side effect of any vaccine.

FAQ: Should someone who is pregnant or breastfeeding get a COVID-19 vaccine?

- Pregnant individuals are at increased risk of severe COVID illness compared to people who are not pregnant.
- Pregnant individuals with COVID-19 are at increased risk of adverse pregnancy outcomes such as preterm birth.
- The American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists and CDC recommend that COVID-19 vaccines be offered to pregnant and breastfeeding individuals when they are available.

FAQ: Should someone who is pregnant or breastfeeding get a COVID-19 vaccine?

Getting vaccinated is a personal choice for people who are pregnant or breastfeeding. A discussion with your healthcare provider might help you make an informed decision.

FAQ: Are the COVID-19 vaccines safe for children?

 The Pfizer vaccine is authorized for people ages 16 and older.

 The Moderna and Johnson & Johnson vaccines are authorized for people ages 18 and older.

• Children under the age of 16 years of age should not get the COVID-19 vaccine right now.


